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# Nouns in English Grammar



#### What are Nouns?

A noun is a word that names a person, place, thing, or idea. It's like a label that we use to identify or refer to something. For **example**, think of your pet dog and his name. Whatever it is, like 'Tuffy', Buddy', or 'Luna', all of these are nouns.

## Types of Nouns with Examples

Now that we know what nouns and their types are, let's explore the different types on the basis of examples from the table below:


Common Noun	These are general names for people, places, or things, such as " <b>dog</b> ," " <b>city</b> ," or " <b>book</b> ."
Proper Noun	Proper nouns are specific names for people, places, or things, like " <b>John</b> ," " <b>Paris</b> ," or " <b>Harry</b> <b>Potter</b> ."
Collective Noun	Imagine a bunch of bees buzzing around. That is a collective noun. It names a group of things as a whole, like ' <b>flock</b> ' for birds or ' <b>team</b> ' for players.
Abstract Noun	These nouns denote things you can not touch, but you can feel them. They name ideas and feelings like <b>love</b> , <b>courage</b> , or <b>freedom</b> .
Material Noun	Ever wondered what your toy car is made of? These tell us the stuff things are made of, like <b>wood</b> , <b>plastic</b> , or even <b>chocolate</b> .

### How to Use Nouns?

Nouns play important roles in sentences. They can be subjects, objects, or parts of phrases. Let's see some examples:

- Subject: "The cat chased the mouse."
- Object: "Sarah loves chocolate."
- Noun Phrase: "The big, red balloon floated in the sky."
